NEW is a non-profit research center which relies on private contributions and grants from foundations and does not solicit funds from corporations. The publications from NEW are directed to all Northwesterners with decisions to make about the future -- from elected officials to students, from community activists to business executives, and from news editors to concerned citizens.
